Sometimes a yarn will dictate what is to be made with it. That is the case with this yarn. It has a drape & feel that is meant to wrap around your neck. The scarf itself is a very easy piece to make as every row is knit (Garter Stitch). The stripey flared ends are created by working a short row in a contrast color of yarn. There are 2 different lengths to each scarf so they can be layered together if desired. Of course wearing them separately is fine too.

Materials:

- Knit One Crochet Too **Babyboo** (55% nylon/45% Bamboo) 50 gms/115 yds. colors: Bright Aqua (548) MC & Lime (570) CC 1 skein each color (enough to make both scarves)
- US #5 (3.75 mm) 24" (or larger) circular needle (see Note 5)
- Tapestry needle
- Small safety pin or stitch marker that can be removed (for marking Right Side of scarf)

Gauge: 20 sts x 36 rows in garter st

Finished size:

Longer Version: 40 inches long by 2 inches wide
Shorter Version: 31 inches long by 2 inches wide
*Flare at ends is 3.5 inches wide

Abbreviations:

K = Knit

P = Purl

W&T = With yarn in back, slip next st as if to purl. Bring yarn forward between the needles and slip st back to right needle. Turn work (otherwise known as a "wrap and turn").

CO = cast on

St = stitch

RS = right side

WS = wrong side

Note 1: One skein of 2 colors will make both of these scarves.

Note 2: When working the W&T make sure to keep the wrap loose so it doesn't create a hole at that spot. Do not knit the wrap when you reach that point in the next row.

Note 3: To keep edges neat, when changing colors at the ends of a row bring previous color forward and over the new color so the yarns will twist or wrap around each other. This will prevent long floats of yarn at the edges.

Note 4: For each scarf, a small ball of contrasting yarn should be made by cutting a 7 yard piece from the CC skein. This small ball will be referred to as CC2. CC1 will refer to the larger skein.

Note 5: When casting on and binding off, you may want to use the next needle size up to insure that the stitches are loose enough.

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Instructions:

Using the long tail cast-on method & MC, loosely CO the following number of stitches (see Note 5):

Longer version: 160 sts.

Shorter version: 130 sts

Row 1: (WS) Knit across row.

Row 2: (RS) With CC1, K1O, W&T, K1O. Slide all sts to the opposite end of needle and turn work. With CC2 and WS facing, P1O, W&T, P1O. Slide all sts back to other end of needle. Use a safety pin or removable stitch marker (if desired) to mark RS of scarf. Begin **Row 3** on a RS row.

Row 3 on a RS row.

Row 3-6: Knit across row.

Repeat **Rows 2-6**, three (3) more times.

Repeat **Row 2** (RS).

Next Row: (RS) Knit across row.

Bind off all sts loosely in knit stitch (see Note 5). Break yarn. When weaving in loose ends of yarn, make sure to do so into the matching background color. Block lightly, flaring the ends outs slightly (refer to finished measurements). I used an upright steamer for the results you see here.
